



Whozit Whatzit

Purpose/Benefits:

The general purpose of this exercise focuses on teamwork and having fun as a group.

Energy Level:

Moderate: Chapter members do not need to move around, however discussion and excitement amongst each other may get loud.

Settings/Materials Needed:

Need a white board or flip chart and markers to write up the Whozit Whatzit puzzle.

Method:

You can break chapter members up into groups or have them work as one big group to solve the Whozit Whatzit puzzle. Each puzzle contains several familiar words. When carefully read and sounded out, the words reveal the name of a well-known person, place, thing, or phrase. As students figure out the hidden names, they write their responses on a small sheet of scrap paper. The facilitator can wander the room checking their guesses; this can also be done aloud verbally. You can provide a clue if chapter members have trouble figuring it out.

Examples:

- Tub Braid Heap Bunch (Clue: TV show)—The Brady Bunch
- Sand Tackle Laws (Clue: Fictional Character)—Santa Claus
- Tall Mischief Her Sun (Clue: Person)—Thomas Jefferson
- Buck Spun He (Clue: Cartoon Character)— Bugs Bunny
- These Hound Dove Moo Sick (Clue: movie)—The Sound of Music
- Docked Hearse Whose (Clue: Person)—Dr. Seuss
- Tight An Hick (Clue: thing)—Titanic
- Aisle Oh View (Clue: phrase)—I love you
- Chick He Tub Ban An Us (Clue: things)—Chiquita Bananas
- My Gulch Hoard Un (Clue: person)—Michael Jordan
- Thumb Ill Key Wake Owl Licks He (Clue: place)—The Milky Way Galaxy
